# January Meeting, 1/17/2018

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Our meeting on Wednesday, January 17th, 2018 will be at Wake Robin retirement community Activity Center in Shelburne. To get a chance to tour the woodshop as well as preview 'show and tell' items, come as early as 6:30PM.

Directions to the meeting place: Proceed to Rte. 7 in Shelburne (exit 13 if coming via I-89) and at the light at the SE corner of Shelburne Museum (this is the more southerly of the two traffic lights in the village) and proceed west from the light onto Bostwick Rd. One mile down on the left is Wake Robin Drive. Take that to the 3rd right, Colman Way. The Activity Center is at the end of the street ~ 100 yards. (Note. For GPS,

use 200 Wake Robin Drive. Once on Wake Robin, GPS may not work well). In the Activity Center take the stairs on the left to the basement. An elevator is also available.

The demonstration is our annual round table presentation of an extended 'show and tell'. We invite all members to share anything they may have learned related to woodturning in the past year. This may be your latest bowl, a new tool or technique, a unique piece of wood or an anecdote. Share your knowledge. We can't get enough!

## About Carving Tools—Dave Buchholz

When I gave my demonstration of carving at the November Woodchuck meeting, the flexible shaft broke. Since I have used this carver for at least 12 years, I can't complain too much. I needed to find a replacement for the inner spring inside the flexible shaft. This provides the mechanical power for either the rotary chuck or the reciprocating carver that fit on the end of the shaft. I thought that Lowes sold flexible shafts for Dremels and indeed they do but these appear to have a permanently attached chuck. For the reciprocating carver you need a flexible shaft where you can change the tool holder at the end. All I needed was the long inner spring and I finally found a source on the web from a Canadian company, Chipping Away. The cost was just under

\$10. For \$140 this company also sells the Wecheer power carver, which I used for the demonstration. This includes the Dremel-like motor plus the flexible shaft and both the reciprocating and rotary handpieces. They also sell the reciprocating handpiece separately at a lower cost. Woodworker's Supply sells a Woodtek carver which looks remarkably like the Wecheer carver that I have. Their sale price is \$113. The carver comes with some carving and grinding tools. I have never used the carving tools since I purchased the much higher quality ones from Flexcut. Another option if you have a Dremel and just want the flexible shaft and reciprocating carver is to look into the option at Highland's. This cost about \$60.







Gifford Elder Community bought a SawStop table saw for the woodshop, to go with the tools I donated. It came unassembled on a pallet weighing almost 500 pounds. This is the I.75 HP Professional cabinet saw with 52" table, costing almost \$3,000 FOB.

It came with most of the tools needed for assembly and operation. To assemble, some metric wrenches and a level were also needed. The various parts are heavy and having an assistant would have made the job very easy. As it was, the only step I used help with, was standing the cabinet up. Putting the tables and the fence rail on, I used a stand to steady the ends I was not holding while bolting the parts together. Changing blades and stop cartridges is incredibly easy.





Wrenches are supplied for the blade nut. No other tools are needed to undo the table insert or the cartridge. An alignment tool to set the cartridge spacing is supplied. The table insert is self-locking and no screws hold it down. The fence is easily adjustable and was perfectly square with the blade as delivered. I found that the motor was quite powerful. Use of both the fence and the miter gauge were accurate and moved easily. Blade height and angle are adjusted with large, friction-lockable wheels.

The stop cartridge is single-use and costs \$70-\$90, so I did not test it. Safety of the tool seems excellent, as the on-off switch is controlled electronically.

SawStop table saws range from \$1,300 up. They are all heavy duty and very safe.

Turns out that I am a bigger wood hoarder than I ever imagined - go figure. I cleaned up a back corner of my shop that has not been disturbed for over 5+ years and I have a large number of wood blocks that I'm willing to part with. They include a mix of Maple, Cherry, Elm, Ash, Butternut, Apple, Walnut, Hickory and possibly a few others. They range in size from 2" x 2" up to 6" x 6" with most 10" - 16" in length. Most have dates when I "put them away" and my shop is heated in winter and dehumidified in summer so moisture content should be good for air dried wood.

I also have a number of roughed out bowl blanks in various woods. Most are small to medium in size.

Greetings Fellow Woodchucks.....with a capital "W"!

My first communique from my southern base, I will not taunt you with reports of endless balmy weather and sunshine. Yes, it is all relative, but this time the entire nation has been experiencing something nasty from mother nature that we have not seen for a few years. The snow line from the last system crept to within 50 miles of my home in west central Florida! Let's hope the worst is over!!

I have talked in the past about how in this land (meaning Florida) of seemingly nothing for trees but pine and palm, we actually have quite an abundance of hardwood species. The hurricane that delivered a glancing blow to us here did bring down a lot of trees, and we have been getting weekly loads of logs from arborists and utility companies with whom we have a relationship. Below is a sampling of our recent bounty.



Photo # 0240: All that remains of a huge cache of Florida rosewood. This is our premium species. I turns nicely and finishes beautifully. Because it is so oily you can buff it without any added finish.

Photo # 0237: Norfolk Island pine. We get a lot of this. Not a pine at all actually, it turns nicely and spalts beautifully. Photo # 0232 shows a vessel made by our



club guru, Franck Johannesen(http://www.franckswoodturning.com/). The red splotches are branches. The horns allude to his Norwegian heritage in some way that he hasn't fully explained!



Photo # 0234 All that remains of a large cherry laurel tree. The orange color goes away when turned. It cuts very cleanly and finishes beautifully, white with reddish grain lines. It cracks easily when drying, so mostly we once-turn pieces from this.

Photo # 0231 A lovely flame alder vessel. We don't get this often, but it is spectacular when we do!



Photo # 0233 This shows a pallet of blanks destined for our Food Shelf (https://www.allfaithsfoodbank.org/) fundraiser next Fall. Every Tuesday for the last six weeks we have gathered to cut these blanks.....over 2 hundred and



counting!.... for our members to make bowls to give to them which they then give to anyone donating \$25 or more. This is a huge operation here! Last year they gave out over 9,000,000 pounds of food to needy Floridians!! (Continued on page 11)
